



C3PO CONVALESCENT PLASMA STUDY



Thank you for participating in the Clinical Trial of COVID-19 Convalescent Plasma in Outpatients (C3PO), a multi-centered national study. This clinical trial is testing whether giving convalescent plasma early during COVID-19 illness can prevent mild COVID-19 from becoming more severe.

What has already happened?

In the emergency department, you received an infusion of either convalescent plasma or placebo (water mixed with minerals and multivitamins). Researchers took blood samples that will be used to measure your levels of antibodies to the virus that causes COVID-19.

What happens next?

After you go home, we are most interested in whether your symptoms improved or worsened or if you have any problems AFTER your initial emergency department visit. In follow-up surveys or calls, please tell us about any visits to a doctor, urgent care, emergency department or hospital that you have AFTER your initial emergency department visit.

How should I manage this illness at home?

- Follow all the instructions from your medical team.
- Seek medical care if your symptoms become serious or are worsening.
- The Centers for Disease Control has advice about managing COVID-19 at home*
- Tell your local study team if you have to go to another doctor, urgent care, emergency department or hospital.

What do I still need to do?

You will be contacted every other day for the next two weeks to see how you are recovering by our national C3PO follow-up team at Stanford University in Palo Alto, CA. **Please answer their email or phone call so that we can learn if your treatment is working.**

- The team will send you an email with a few questions about how you are feeling, and you can answer these questions by clicking on the survey email.
- If you do not wish to use email or do not respond to email, a team member will text or call the phone numbers that you provided. This phone call will come from Area Code "650" (Stanford University in Palo Alto, CA).
- If you do not answer, then the Stanford team will ask your local study team to check to see if you are feeling OK.

Your local study team will arrange two follow-up visits around 15 days and 30 days after your ED visit. At this visit, they will draw blood to measure your antibodies and your response to the virus that causes COVID-19.
